Some qira'at emphasize the "qaf" sound, while others give more prominence to the "ta" sound.

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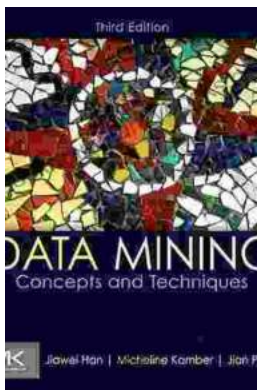
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
